Professor Schroeder received his Doctorate in Economics from the University of Wisconsin in 1971. In the early 1970s, he was at the Faculty of Economics at Georgia State University. In 1977, he transferred to the Department of Public Administration and Economics at Maxwell School, Syracuse University, and served here until 1994, when he was a professor of public and environmental affairs at Indiana University. He joined the faculty of Maxwell School in 1998. Dr. Sjoquist specializes in public finances, especially state and local public finances, and has extensive research interests in urban economics, especially local economic development and central urban poverty, as well as education policy. Stephan's research interests focus on the careers of researchers and engineers, as well as on the process by which knowledge moves beyond the institutional boundaries of the economy. Stephan currently serves on the Board of the Research Council for Higher Education and Workforce. He served on the National Advisory General Medical Sciences Council, National Institutes of Health, 2005-2009 and served on the Advisory Committee of the Social, Behavioral and Economic Program, national science foundation, 2001-2008. He was a member of the European Commission's high-level expert group, which produced the report Frontier Research: The European Challenge. He has served on several committees of the National Research Council, including: The Committee on Methods of Predicting Demand and Supply for Life Scientists and Engineers and the Committee on The Political Impact of International Postgraduate Students and Postdoctoral Researchers in the United States. His research has been supported by the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation, the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation and the National Science Foundation. Dr. Stephan graduated from Grinnell College (Phi Beta Kappa) with a master's degree in economics and received both a master's and a Doctorate in Economics from the University of Michigan. He has been a visiting scholar at Katholieke Universiteit Leuven in Belgium in spring 2005, a Wertheim Fellow at Harvard University in February 2007 and an ICER fellow in Turin, Italy, in autumn 2009, spring 2011 and autumn 2011. He has also worked as a visiting scholar at the Department of Economics, Cogneiti de Martis, the University of Torino in spring 2011 and autumn 2011. Stephan is a research associate at the National Bureau of Economic Research. Stephan has published numerous articles in magazines such as The American Economic Review, Science, The Journal of Economic Literature, Economic Inquiry, The International Economic Review and Social Studies of Science.
