And like any app you probably spend a lot of time with, there are probably a few things you hate about the Apple App Store. As Mike Beasley reported some time ago about 9to5Mac, the App Store has been around since iOS 2.0, when iOS was still called Phone OS. But along the way, she has acquired some annoying chut choists and has failed to address some usability concerns. Unfortunately, some of these bugs are still hanging around, so Apple has a lot to fix with future versions of iOS (we're looking for you, iOS 10). Read on to learn more about some of the worst things about the iOS App Store - and start thinking about how much better things will be with the solutions we hope Apple will implement in the future.

1. Bad detection options and recommendations If you want a new app or a new game but do not know exactly what you are looking for, it can be quite difficult to find something to download. The Recommended tab in the App Store tries to solve the problem by winding apps into a number of categories, including the best new apps, best new games, popular apps, popular games, and an ever-rotating selection of collections (such as the best apps optimized for new iPhone or most holiday games). When things get more interesting, it's when you tap the Categories option in the upper-left corner. You can browse dozens of different categories, all with their own unique collections. Apple can make it easier to take advantage of all these curated lists by scratching them on the front page. After all, it knows what apps you've downloaded, so how hard would the App Store be to offer you smarter, more personalized recommendations for new apps that might seem interesting to you? The lack of lists curator from other countries On the topic of desire that we can get smarter recommendations of downloadable applications, how great would it be if you could browse collections of applications curated by your favorite photographers, the staff of this magazine you can't put, or respected website on an interesting topic? Apple has its own curated and many of them in the App Store. But No. lists of apps from individuals or posts you respect can give you insight into the apps and tools people use, especially for things like mobile photography. 3. Apple's frustrating search functionality recently updated the App Store search algorithm to give you more accurate results when searching with a keyword. But it's still harder than it should be to find an app when you don't know what it's called. Think about it: You can easily find an app if you know its name (or at least part of its name). But when you search for an app that can perform a particular task, all bets are off. Keyword typing usually returns hundreds of results, but there's no way it's filtered by free or paid apps, and there's no functionality to further refine your search. The App Store shows you related keywords, but that's usually a little help. 4. There is no way to try an app before you buy it. This has led many developers to create free, limited versions of their paid apps or make the initial download free and offer basic features like in-app purchases. But the App Store will benefit from adding a demo feature that allows you to get a free trial of an app before you buy it. The feature can give you some peace of mind if you're considering spending more than a dollar or two on an app: if there's an option to try the app and then get your money back! No social features Ever wonder what apps have downloaded your friends, or which ones have they added to the wish lists to download later? If so, too bad because the App Store will not tell you. Apple can add a number of different social features to the App Store. Consider, for example, how much easier it would be to get your friends to try out this new messaging app or photo-sharing app if you can share apps directly in the App Store (not by sending a link via iMessage). And think about how much easier it would be to follow the guidance of your best friend who loves his apps, who always has the best apps before anyone else has heard of them - if he can selectively share his recommendations on a list, you can browse straight from the App Store. 6. There is no way to find sales and deals There are tons of tech blogs and Twitter accounts that can alert you to great apps that have temporarily reduced their price, or are even free to download for a limited time. The App Store, inexplicably, does not offer an easy way to find these deals without relying on an external source. In the future, Apple could add a section to highlight these limited time deals and special sales - something app developers and iOS users will no doubt appreciate. Untrustworthy review This is an issue that many users are familiar with when the news broke that many of Amazon's reviews are fake. While it can be skipped through user reviews to determine whether an app is worth the download time or purchase price, you probably can't trust all of these reviews. Much less popular apps have only a few reviews to start with, and it's disheartening to realize that some of these reviews are likely left by people who made the app (or their friends or employees). You could argue that this isn't really an Apple problem, but the App Store may require users to spend some time with an app before reviewing to try to protect themselves from fake reviews. In the meantime, it's best to read real reviews on reliable blogs if you're concerned about wasting money or time in an app. There are no updates for Apple's own apps While you can update all other apps on your iPhone from the Updates tab in the App Store, there are never updates for apps that are preinstalled on your iPhone. Why is that? Because Apple fixes bugs and adds features to these apps through iOS updates. This means that even when there is a simple glitch in Apple Music or a clear feature to run to Mail, you need to go through a lengthy process of installing an update to the phone's operating system. In the future, Apple may implement simple fixes for its own apps through the App Store, making them just as painless to update as any other third-party app. While the iPhone can't cure lepers or turn water into wine, it can help you do many other useful things, such as sharing high-resolution videos, diagnosing your own ailments and even creating your own virtual life form! With the Apple iPhone App Store due online today, we decided to look at some of the more interesting third-party programs, apps and websites that have been developed to make your iPhone an integral tool for work and fun. For IT departments that want to have better control over how iPhones interact with their networks, Azaleos has expanded its OneStop email remote monitoring services to the new 3G iPhone. Azaleos, a Seattle company that traditionally provides email management for BlackBerry and Windows Mobile devices, uses Microsoft ActiveSync technology to bring mobile devices under the control of the Subscription OneStop service, which provides 24-hour monitoring, support and management. The OneStop service is part of Azaleos' OneServer package, which features a dedicated device on an IT network that provides active/passive, fault-tolerant and cluster for corporate communications. Open Source, an open source software development company that specializes in mobile app servers, now provides a free open source email app for iPhone. From this week, iPhone users will be able to Information Management Data (PIM) free of charge through the company's myUNAMBOL portal to popular email systems such as Gmail, Yahoo and AOL. Funambol's wireless synchronization platform, which is supported through ads, is also available on Windows Mobile and BlackBerry devices and will soon also be available on Google Android devices. The application software can be downloaded directly from the myUNAMBOL website. For anyone who gets tired of their wallet or purse wrapped in business cards, 211me business cards can only be a ticket. 211me, which describes itself as a mobile mash-up company, allows users to generate their own cards, flyers and promotions designed specifically for mobile phones. In this way, companies can create digital business cards for their employees or design promotions that can be sent electronically to any mobile phone in the United States. All flyers and business cards can also be shared on social networking sites such as Facebook and Friendster, the company says. Users can design their own content by uploading their photos to the 211me website, where they can choose from a wide variety of backgrounds and text styles. The concept behind RemindYou is extremely simple - essentially, its purpose is to ensure you never miss a date again. And how does he do that? Well, by syncing with iCal, Outlook, or Entourage, and then overlaying the schedule of all your appointments on the iPhone's home image. This way, instead of seeing a picture of Earth from space as the default start screen every time you unlock your iPhone, you'll see a list of all your appointments. Nuance is already working on bringing its voice recognition technology to the iPhone to drastically reduce the need for users to peck at Qwerty keyboards. It works this way: run the app from the iPhone startup menu, click on the talking button after the app launches, you can orally tell the program what you want to search for, and then click on Stop. Over the past two years, Twitter has taken the online world by storm as a happy environment between blogging and texting. By allowing To post updates of up to 140 characters on their social media pages, Twitter has emerged as a popular way for people to provide real-time updates on the work and life of their friends. Colleagues, Twitterific, an interface developed by software company Iconfactory, is designed specifically to provide Twitter capabilities for Mac users and is available for prison-broken iPhones from last year. It will officially come to the iPhone later this week. For fans of old-school eight-bit graphics games comes Bomberman Touch (see below) from legendary Japanese gaming company Hudson Soft. The bomber tells the trapped story of a disgruntled bomber trying to escape his factory job by blowing up a lot of things up. Don't be afraid because health information and benefit technology company A.D.A.M. has developed a web application that allows users to match their medical symptoms with assessments and potential treatments. In addition, the navigator gives users information about when they can help themselves through self-care or whether they should consult a healthcare professional. The company says that medical data and information provided by a medical examiner and URAK-accredited Health Encyclopedia. If 8GB of iPhone storage is not enough for you to give Syncplicity's online storage service a try. Synchronization allows you to store up to 2GB of documents, pictures, music and video files for free and allows you to access it instantly from your iPhone from the cloud. All you need to do to access your stored data is to sign in to the Syncplicity website and then view the stored documents. An old but goodie, AOL Instant Messenger is one of the classic web apps for chatting and keeping in touch with your friends. Let's say you want to bid online for a 1955 electric guitar at Gibson Les Paul, but you don't have time to sit in front of a computer screen all day. Simple! Just wear around your iPhone and use your native iPhone on eBay to get constant updates when this punk that's called Gtrfan62 has hit its offer. The eBay app is free and available in the App Store. Do not want to leave behind in online online Worldwide, AP has created a mobile news network to provide readers with the latest headlines on politics, sports, business and entertainment. The AP iPhone app is free and available in the App Store. Although it sounds like an app developed specifically for stalkers, Loopt's social card tool is actually a location-based program designed to let you see where your friends are hanging in your area.
